Penrith Town Council has awarded a grant of £575 to Eden Dodgeball Club to establish a new under 15's dodgeball session for children aged 13-15 in Penrith.

Started in September 2024 and taking place each Friday, the new under 15's dodgeball session has attracted around 20 young people each week - engaging them with a unique, fun and active activity each week.

The Council grant has supported the club in purchasing essential equipment, helping with the costs of venue hire and ensuring trained coaches are available to deliver high-quality, engaging dodgeball sessions Penrith's young people.

### On Friday 8 November 2024, Cllr. Doug Lawson, Penrith Town Council Chair and Penrith Mayor visited a session held by Eden Dodgeball Club at Queen Eizabeth Grammar School (QEGS) and said:

"Thank you to Ben from Eden Dodgeball Club for allowing us to come and visit a session at QEGS and see first hand the enjoyment the young people get from these fantastic dodgeball sessions!

"It's exciting to see a local club dedicated to growing their youth programs, and I am proud to see the Council being able to make that happen through the award of this grant."

### Ben Hoyle, Chairperson and Coach at Eden Dodgeball Club said:

"The grant provides a fantastic boost for our club – as it allows us to introduce dodgeball to even more young people, giving them a fun and active outlet in a supportive environment.

"We've seen firsthand how dodgeball helps develop skills like teamwork, communication, and self-confidence, and we're excited to see how this new under 15's session will grow."

Eden Dodgeball Club runs 3 sessions each week in the gym at QEGS with under 11's from 5-6pm and under 13's/15's from 6-7pm on a Friday evening. 



### **Recommendations:**

To agree the following recommendations:

i. Penrith Town Council continue to provide the Eden District Talking Newspaper Association with a monthly copy of Penrith Town Council News to include in their recordings.

### Law and Legal Implications

The Town Council resolved from 15 May 2023, until the next relevant Annual Meeting of the Council, that having met the conditions of eligibility as defined in the Localism Act 2011 and SI 965 The Parish Councils (General Power of Competence) (Prescribed Conditions) Order 2012, to adopt the General Power of Competence.

### 1. Report Details

- 1.1. The Council are continually seeking to maintain and increase the community's access to information and improve transparency and accountability.
- 1.2. The Council's primary means of corporate communication with the public is the monthly newsletter: "Penrith Town Council News", a round-up of the latest developments and news at the Council.
- 1.3. The newsletter is distributed through a number of digital and printed channels, including through recordings in an arrangement with the Eden District Talking Newspaper Association (EDTNA).
- 1.4. Communities Committee agreed (Minute reference: CC23/37) to partner with the EDTNA back in December 2023, however wanted to review the arrangement after a year.
- 1.5. The EDTNA records and distributes readings of items of interest from the Cumberland and Westmorland Herald to visually impaired locals each week.
- 1.6. Anyone in the Eden area who is registered blind or visually impaired may receive the recordings free of charge. They also loan the equipment to play back the recording.
- 1.7. Recordings of the news are placed onto memory sticks and are then split into 10 sub-folders ("channels") which include "Main News", "Births, Deaths and

- Marriages", "Farming and Countryside", "People" and through this arrangement "Penrith Town Council News".
- 1.8. The total number of recipients is circa 60, with a majority of recipients living in Penrith.
- 1.9. It is still felt by the EDTNA that there is a large number of potential users who are still unaware of the free service coupled with an increase in the population of visually impaired people in Cumbria point toward a potential increase in the number of recipients of the service in the near future.
- 1.10. Advertising in this manner has allowed Council information to reach blind and partially sighted people in Penrith along with the various groups making the recordings of the news themselves.
- 1.11. Feedback from service users and from the various groups making the recordings has been overwhelmingly positive enabling the Council to reach groups of residents it never had before this arrangement informing them of Council news.
- 1.12. Recordings are also made available through the Penrith Town Council website: <a href="https://www.penrithtowncouncil.gov.uk/information/newsletter/">https://www.penrithtowncouncil.gov.uk/information/newsletter/</a>
- 1.13. It is therefore recommended that Penrith Town Council continue to provide the EDTNA with a monthly copy of Penrith Town Council News to include in their recordings.

### 2. Options Analysis Including Risk Assessment

### a) Risk

Penrith Town Council does not communicate with visually impaired locals who receive these recordings.

### Consequence

Those individuals are disenfranchised from Penrith Town Council information.

### b) Controls Required

To partner with the Eden District Talking Newspaper Association.

### 3. Financial and Resource Implications

- 3.1 Cost for including Penrith Town Council News onto circa 60 memory sticks twelve times a year: £25 per month / £300 per annum.
- 3.2 There will be a staffing implication for the Council's staff to provide the content needed in each edition, but it is considered that the time and workload is manageable within existing resources.

**Purpose of Report:** 

Consider the proposals to support two projects at Cumbria Wildlife Trust's Cold Springs site in Penrith.

### **Recommendations:**

i. To consider whether the Communities Committee would be minded to support two projects at the Cold Springs Nature Reserve site and if supportive, indicate the level of funding it would provide to the Cumbria Wildlife Trust to deliver the Wildlife Garden and Pond Platform.

### **Law and Legal Implications**

The Town Council resolved from 15 May 2023, until the next relevant Annual Meeting of the Council, that having met the conditions of eligibility as defined in the Localism Act 2011 and SI 965 The Parish Councils (General Power of Competence) (Prescribed Conditions) Order 2012, to adopt the General Power of Competence.

### 1. Report Details

- 1.1 The Council have been in correspondence with the Cumbria Wildlife Trust in relation to its development of the Cold Springs Nature Reserve, Penrith for several years.
- 1.2 Three fields at Cold Springs, adjacent to Beacon Edge, were gifted to Cumbria Wildlife Trust in 2022. In consultation with community groups, Cumbria Wildlife Trust are developing this previously inaccessible farmland into quality green space for the community, increasing wildlife in the area and providing a valuable amenity for Penrith. A site plan detailing developments at the site can be viewed at Appendix A.
- 1.3 Cumbria Wildlife Trust aim to provide people of all ages and backgrounds access to nature, improve the mental and physical wellbeing of the Penrith community and safeguard the land at Cold Springs for the future.
- 1.4 An opportunity has arisen for the Council to partner with the Cumbria Wildlife Trust to deliver two projects at the Cold Springs Nature Reserve site.
- 1.5 The Council held a Councillor Budget Workshop on the 02 October 2024 at which potential schemes of work were proposed which could be included in next years approved budget or be met from the general reserve given the level of reserve the Council currently has. It was outlined that any potential projects or schemes of work that were considered at a point of delivery in the near future could be brought forward from the budget process and instead considered by committee or council on an individual basis.
- 1.6 A follow-up budget workshop was held on the 21 October 2024 at which two projects identified at Cold Springs Nature Reserve were considered appropriate to be considered by the Communities Committee for support given their likelihood of delivery and community benefit. These two projects are set out below:

### **Project 1: Cold Springs Wildlife Garden**

The Cumbria Wildlife Trust aim to create a wildlife garden with sensory elements which can be enjoyed by the public but will also be used practically by Cold Springs Care Home. Design of the garden has begun - in consultation with Cold Springs Care Home and their horticulture team – with broad community support for the project. Cumbria Wildlife Trust also hope to include a group with visual impairments and an autism support group in their consultation. Their aim is to create a place to sit, relax and enjoy nature.

The garden will have accessible paths and seating, and a private access entrance directly from the care home. Cumbria Wildlife Trust would look to create raised beds so that residents of the home could be included in the gardening and ongoing care.

The garden could be used for various engagement activities, from mental health exercises to gardening workshops.

Outline cost estimates are detailed below:

### **Project 2: Cold Springs Pond Platforms**

Two ponds have been created on the south side of the reserve. They are already blooming with wildlife, including two rare species of dragonfly.

Cumbria Wildlife Trust would like to build platforms next to the pond to provide safe opportunities for educational provision such as pond dipping. Two local primary schools and Ullswater Community College (UCC) are already invested in offering pond dipping to their students from this site.

The platforms will also help in ongoing surveying and water monitoring - to see the effects of our work on local biodiversity and map the site's environmental progress.

Outline cost estimates are detailed below:

<u>Detail</u>	Cost

<u>Total</u>	£6,500

- 1.7 Project 1 & Project 2 are currently unfunded, with the Cumbria Wildlife Trust also seeking funding from external funders to deliver these projects.
- 1.8 It is considered that supporting either or both of these projects would align to the Council's Climate Strategy, particularly the ambition to increase the number of "green" projects in Penrith.
- 1.9 The Committee is being asked to consider whether it wishes to support either or both of these projects, and if supportive indicate the level of funding it would like to provide to the Cumbria Wildlife Trust to deliver these projects.

### 2. Options Analysis including risk assessment

### a) Risk

Financial risk should any funds not be used for the intended purpose.

### b) Consequence

Funds incorrectly used.

### c) Controls Required

Any financial contribution made to the Cumbria Wildlife Trust would be subject to conditions relating to the proper and effective use of the contribution for the approved purpose, with conditions set out in a Service Level Agreement. Payment of any financial contribution could be scheduled to be made upon confirmation of an official works order or upon receipt of invoices.

### 3. Financial and Resource Implications

Should members wish to support either of these projects, the Committee will need to indicate the level of funding it would like to provide.

It is suggested that any funding contribution be met from the Climate Change budget which has an approved budget of £15,000 for the current financial year. There has been expenditure of £1,459 to date, and there remains an uncommitted balance of £13,541.

### 4. Equalities Implications

None.

### 5. Climate Change and Environmental Implications

The projects would align to the Council's Climate Strategy – in which it states an ambition to enable more green projects in Penrith.

Consider providing a donation of £2,000 from the Arts and Culture budget to community stakeholders for a marmalade themed event in Penrith on 26 April 2025 that aligns with the Dalemain World Marmalade Awards.

### **Recommendations:**

- i. Agree in principle to provide a donation of £2,000 from the Arts and Culture budget to deliver a small marmalade themed event in Penrith.
- ii. That the Council supports the organisation of the event via a donation, promotion and guidance if required.

### **Law and Legal Implications**

The Town Council resolved from 15 May 2023, until the next relevant Annual Meeting of the Council, that having met the conditions of eligibility as defined in the Localism Act 2011 and SI 965 The Parish Councils (General Power of Competence) (Prescribed Conditions) Order 2012, to adopt the General Power of Competence.

### **Report Details**

- 1.1 Every April a Marmalade Festival is held at Dalemain, situated on the outskirts of Penrith, which is a culmination of the annual Dalemain World Marmalade Awards, a competition to find the best marmalade in the world.
- 1.2 The event began in 2005 and over the years marmalade makers, spanning generations, from Taiwan to Brazil, Norway to Northern Ireland, India to Argentina have entered the competition with many of them visiting Dalemain and the surrounding area. The winner of the competition is cobranded with and sold at Fortnum & Mason.
- 1.3 The festival has raised more than £320,000 for charity since it began and has had thousands of entries.
- 1.4 In the past, marmalade themed events such as Penrith Goes Orange have been held in the Town Centre. However, this type of event has not been held for several years.
- 1.5 Paddington Bear is the patron of the Marmalade Festival. The Town Council sponsored Paddington Bear statue situated in Little Dockray, has generated a great deal of publicity and community stakeholders have proposed a small low-key event take place in Penrith celebrating Marmalade which will link with the Dalmaine awards.
- 1.6 The Dalemain World Marmalade Awards celebrates its 20th Anniversary in 2025, and the event will take place on Saturday 26 April 2025. Having the Council sponsored Paddington statue in Penrith and the special anniversary of the marmalade awards provides an ideal opportunity for a new small event to be trialled and delivered by the community.
- 1.7 Initial conversations have been held and ideas discussed between stakeholders
- 1.8 Given the limited timescale to plan the event, it is proposed that an in-principle decision be made to demonstrate the Councils support for stakeholders to deliver a new event with delegated authority given to the Community Services Officer and the Economic Development Officer, to decide if the donation is to be awarded once the stakeholders have created an event plan.

### 2. Options Analysis including risk assessment

a) Risk

The Council do not support stakeholders develop a new event that may enhance the national and international profile of Penrith.

b) **Consequence** 

Council reputation may be impacted.

c) Controls Required

The Council agree support stakeholders to deliver the project.

### 3. Financial and Resource Implications

Final plans have yet not been agreed however, as this is envisaged to be a small event officers are recommending a budget of £2000. This contribution would be funded from the Arts and Culture budget.
