# **Reason for Listing:**

Austere Neo-Classical design. Grey ashlar with hipped slate roof, two storeys, front stuccoed, rear wing of red sandstone. Round-arched entrance with ornamental fanlight, 2 sash windows down and 3 up, with glazing bars and stone sills, the ground floor windows slightly set back in segmental headed openings, tripartite sashes. Large central stack with eight flues in line, a dominant feature.

# **Reason for Listing:**

Possibly an old cross base, placed near Eamont Bridge near the entry to the town in 1598 and used for the transfer of coin between town and country people. Now used as a sculptural feature. A whinstone block 2 ft 6 ins  $\times$  2 ft 0ins  $\times$  1ft 6 ins with stopped chamfer at angles and square recess in top.
